Hoping each of you had a pleasant Thanksgiving holiday & wishing you & your families a peaceful, happy and healthy upcoming holiday season.






It is with sadness that we report another of our alumni, Allan John Janke, 73, passed away Thanksgiving Day, November 24, 2022. While at GHHS, Allan participated in Intramurals, Baseball & Bowling. As a bowler, Al was instrumental in bringing our varsity team to victory. On October 6, 1966, he was high man for the Bulldogs when the team opened its '66-'67 season by whitewashing Glenville. On March 30, 1967, the Varsity bowlers swept the scratch division of the Greater Cleveland Inter-Scholastic Bowling League making it the first time a Garfield team ever won the bowling title. Leading the champions was Allan who finished 7th in the league with a 181 average. Allan is survived by wife, Nancy, two daughters, Michelle & Dawn and five

grandchildren. He was brother to Nancy, and deceased brother, Robert, and deceased sister, Linda. Linda was a 1969 graduate of GHHS. Allan was also the former husband of 1967 graduate, Mary Ann Musarra, who passed away in November 2005, from breast cancer.

Saying Goodbye

As reported in our September/October newsletter this year, former faculty member, William Toneff, passed away



October 11, 2022, at the tender age of 103. Friends gathered for a memorial service on December 3rd, arranged by six friends of Mr. Toneff's who helped him navigate the last years of his life; they were known to Bill as the "Super Six", a name he personally gave them.

Audrey Sopko was approached by one of the "Six" as to whether former members of Triple Trio might be able to come together & sing at the Memorial. Mr. Toneff began his career at GHHS as a music & choir teacher in 1947, and was the first director of Triple Trio that began during the 1956-57 school year. Audrey was happy to accept the challenge, and with Doug Day accompanying, the following performed: Altos: Lee-Ann Franko Spacek (GHHS Class of 1966), Carol Kus Adornetto (GHHS Class of 1965), 2nd Soprano: Janet Scaparotti Grimm (GHHS Class of 1969), Connie Glazewski Adams (GHHS Class of 1965), Diane Hitch Chesko (GHHS Class of 1965). 1st Soprano: Karen Parhamovich Felon (GHHS Class of 1967), Audrey Sopko (GHHS Class of 1967). Six of these ladies were former Trio members and one was a former member of the 1967 A Cappella Choir. They performed "Mr. Wonderful", the song that all alumni heard sung by Triple Trio during the Tri-Hi-Y King & Attendants assembly usually performed near Valentine's Day.

The Memorial attested to the fact that Mr. Toneff led a fascinating life during those 103 years and was an exceptional person and mentor to many, especially to his students. While this editor did not experience his teaching while at GHHS, those of you who did will probably agree that the music and English literature that he taught remains special. He will be missed by many!

<u>Newsy Reflections & Tidbits:</u> Everyone enjoys watching movies, especially during the special time at Christmas. However, Hollywood always has some special ways to make those movies unique. Here are a few tidbits in the making of five Christmas themed movies:

- 1) The department store in 'A Christmas Story' "cleaned up" the script for this movie. Director Bob Clark reportedly scouted more than 20 different cities. He ultimately chose Cleveland, Ohio, for its department store. Highee's was the only flagship store willing to permit filming, but on one condition: the movie could not contain any profanity.
- 2) 'It's a Wonderful Life' created a new kind of snow for the movie. Before the 1946 film, movie makers had used untoasted cornflakes to substitute for snow on set, but the crunchy stuff actually made such a racket under actors' feet, dialogue needed re-dubbing. Afterward, RKO's head of special effects, Russell Shearman, came up with a much better solution for faking the white stuff: a combination of water, soap flakes, foamite and sugar called "chemical snow."
- 3) 'Miracle on 34th Street' was filmed during an actual Macy's Thanksgiving Day parade. Shot on location in New York City, Miracle on 34th Street had one chance to get the parade scene right when they filmed live during the 1946 parade. As Maureen O'Hara who starred in the movie wrote in her memoir, "It was a mad scramble to get all the shots we needed, and we got to do each scene only once,". "It was bitterly cold that day, and Edmund (who played Santa Claus) and I envied Natalie (Wood) and John Payne, who were watching the parade from a window."

- 4) Tom Hanks played five characters in 'The Polar Express'. The actor originally optioned the book hoping to play the conductor and Santa Claus. Later, director Robert Zemeckis considered having him play every role an incredibly ambitious goal that proved too exhausting for Tom. He ultimately is credited as the hero boy's father, conductor, hobo, Scrooge puppet, Santa Claus and the narrator.
- 5) Jim Carrey's **Grinch** makeup took up to eight hours to apply. In addition to having to wear a costume made with dyed yak hair, Jim Carrey also had to sit still for hours at a time to transform into the cold-hearted creature. Other cast members had a much easier time transitioning into the residents of Whoville, wearing prosthetic noses that connected to an upper lip along with dentures, ears and wigs.
